A: The story

Project name:	Scouts for inclusion – IZI (Izviđači za inkluziju)

Introduction to the project:	<p>The project “Scouts for inclusion” was developed in order to overcome prejudices that young people have about people with developmental disabilities, and also to promote integration of people with developmental disabilities into the society, and especially into scout activities.</p> <p>The project was implemented in collaboration with Association of students with disabilities (ASD), to raise awareness among our members and to include children and youth with disabilities in our activities. During the project implementation, the following activities were carried:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. The meetings of representatives of our scout group and Association of students with disabilities (ASD). During the meetings, both organization presented each other their focus and the scope of work. The timeline and the program of the project activities were prepared. In addition, an inclusive project team was established, with 6 members – 3 from the each organization.2. Workshop with the members of our scout group and ASD members. This activity took part in the ASD premises on the 25th of June 2018 in Belgrade, Serbia. Through discussions and games, our members familiarized themselves with the challenges of people with disabilities and talked about tolerance and diversity. Through a mutual discussion, they were resolving certain problems they faced. Also, they discuss about scout activities and how to organize them to be more inclusive. The participants were introduced to the joint activity - a two-day drift on the Sava River, with camping. 10 participants took part in this activity.3. Workshop 2.0 – the 9th of July 2018 in Belgrade. In order to prepare the group for the drift and the camp, scouts prepared practical demonstrations of the skills that would be needed during two-day



	<p>journey. Together, they mapped the potential challenges they might face during the drift and the camp. 12 participants took part in this activity.</p> <p>4. A drift in the Sava River, with an overnight stay in tents. (10 – 11th August 2018) During this two-day drift, we made mixed groups that worked together and supported each other on the drift. In every boat, there was one scout group member and one ASD member. We had preparation activities, long challenging drift and of course, fun activities during the night stay - such as campfire, singing, dancing and games. The next day we had some more workshops – sharing our stories and scouting ones: skills such as tying knots, lighting fires, raising the shelter. 15 participants took part in this activity.</p> <p>6. Evaluation and Celebration - in this joint activity we summarized the impressions of the drift and all previous activities. Scouts presented challenges and difficulties of their local communities with which the children and young people with disabilities are facing, and ways to work together to overcome them. Finally, we celebrated this adventure and new friendships with some board games and pizza.</p>
<p>Objectives and goals:</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Create and maintain friendships between our members and children & youth with disabilities. • To make those with developmental disabilities not feel segregated, but as a part of the society. • Increasing tolerance and breaking stereotypes and myths about children and young people with developmental disabilities • To integrate children and disabled youth, in our organization, and make our scout group an inclusive and welcoming environment for children and youth with developmental disabilities. • To inform and develop mindfulness of our members about everyday problems faced by people with disabilities. • To organize inclusive scout activities such as: camping, hiking, fieldtrips • Increase the membership of the scout organization • Inclusion of the people with developmental disabilities in the scout organization.
<p>To which extent did we meet objectives and goals:</p>	<p>The objectives and goals of the project were reached to full extent. The partnership with ASD has been established and the joint activities were implemented inclusively. The members of the scout group are now sensitised to work with people with developmental disabilities and the diversity is taken into account in all activities.</p>



What did we learn from the project:	The preparation and implementation of this project has been a learning process for our members. With this project, we empowered our members to organize inclusive activities, but most importantly, to always take into the consideration the diversity when planning the activities. This collaboration with ASD has set the grounds for further partnerships with other organizations, showing how much benefit it could give to our activities and to personal growth of our members.
